

Sexual Referrals to Sexual Health Promotion 1:1



Clients who are sexually active or with the indication to be sexually active soon and with the risk of STIs, teenage pregnancy or sexual exploitation

This includes patients who are:

- Practising unprotected sex with multiple sexual partners
- People living with HIV
- Men who have sex with men /Gay/Bisexual/Transitioning/BAME
- Young people, not using contraception
- Young people, at risk of grooming/exploitation e.g. Low self esteem
- In a relationship where there can be an imbalance of power
- **YP at risk of exploitation need to be referred through the SERAF process**





Not So Appropriate Referrals



Patients with the following risk factors, will not be considered as appropriate referrals, if they don't have any other sexual health risks or needs:

- Domestic Abuse
- Sexual Assault Victim
- Learning Disabilities (we are not the commissioned service for LD)
- Drugs/Alcohol dependency
- At Risk of Sexual Health Exploitation (we are not the commissioned service for solely sexual exploitation)
- Sex/Porn dependency
- Sex Offenders

Risk factors may not be appropriate on their own, get in contact with the team to discuss your concerns — we might not be able to see the client for 1:1 support but we may be able to signpost.



1 to 1 Referrals Scenarios



A 15 year old, in care, having sex with a partner who is 5 years older than them. Not using contraception or condoms. This is an appropriate referral as they are is at risk of CSE, STI's including HIV and unplanned pregnancy.

A 17 year old male, who is meeting men for sex and not using condoms or prevention methods (vaccination and PrEP). This is an appropriate referral as they are at risk of CSE, STI's including HIV.

A 16 year old needing support making sexual health choices after their second unplanned pregnancy scare. This is an appropriate referral as she is at risk of unplanned teenage pregnancy, STI's including HIV and needs with contraception and decision making.

A young person with learning disabilities asking peers if they would like to see or touch their genitals. This is an appropriate referral as they are at risk of sexual exploitation, unplanned pregnancy, STI's including HIV.



Outreach Nursing Team



Outreach Nursing- Our outreach nurses can support new mothers under 19 for contraception, young people and vulnerable clients with all aspects of sexual health care who are unable to attend mainstream services.



STIs including HIV



Commonly tested and diagnosed STIs:

- Chlamydia (most commonly diagnosed STI in people aged under 25)
- Gonorrhoea
- HIV
- Syphilis
- HSV (Herpes)
- HPV (Genital Warts)
- Hepatitis B and C (for people in higher risk groups)

Condoms are the only method of contraception that protects against STIs!

Some STI's do not have any symptoms so the only way to know is testing after unprotected sex.

'Window Period' refers to the time between when an infection may have been acquired and when the test can reliably detect that infection, so we may ask patients to repeat screening.



HIV & PrEP





What is HIV?

Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) is a virus that attacks cells that help the body fight infection.

There is no cure, but it is treatable with medicine.

People living with HIV on effective treatment cannot pass the virus on to their sexual partners.

PEP stands for Post Exposure Prophylaxis PrEP stands for Pre-exposure Prophylaxis

A lesson plan with facilitator notes for HIV is currently under development and will be available in time for HIV testing week in February 2021!

Contraception



Contraception helps prevent pregnancy

Some methods are long-lasting (fit & forget), some of which are reversible

Some methods rely on the person taking them regularly (i.e. pill) or each time they have sex (condom)

External condom



Pills



Coil



Internal condom



Depo Injection



Implant



Emergency Contraception



Emergency Contraception (morning after pill) is taken after the incident of unprotected sex or failed contraception (e.g. split condom/ missed pills)

It should be accessed as soon as possible after the incident of unprotected sex

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Get It On Condom Card is also known as the C-Card (Condom card)

Get it On (GIO) is the condom distribution scheme running across Hampshire, Isle of Wight, Portsmouth and Southampton.

Anyone under 25 can get free condoms from lots of different organisations. Even if they are under 16 years old they can still join the scheme.
